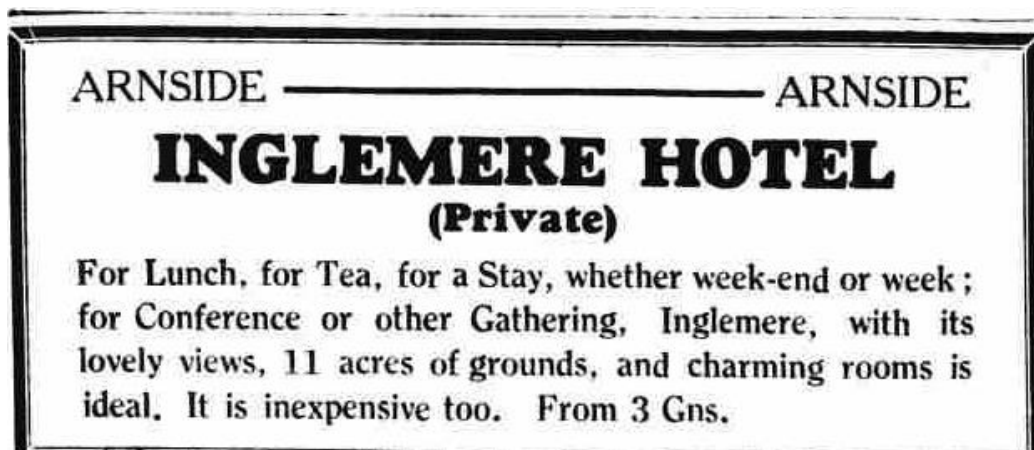


INGLEMERE HOTEL

‘No Smoke, No Dust, No noise’

(1933) 30 bedrooms, 11 acres lovely grounds,
tennis, terrace with mountain and sea views,
Terms 10s a day; £3.35 a week.

Thus, was the Inglemere Hotel advertised in newspapers across the country in the 1930s.

The house was built as a private residence around 1872 for a Mr R. F. Thompson, a

solicitor - probably the first development of substance on Red Hills plateau.

Sadly, Thompson was drowned when his yacht sank in Morecambe Bay in 1888. In 1908 the house and grounds were purchased at auction and greatly extended. From 1911 it was used as a new home for a boarding school for girls, established in 1905 and became **Inglemere School for Girls**.

By the 1930s the building has become a hotel as can be seen from the advert at the top of the page.

The Nicholson family bought the property in the 1940s continuing to run it as a hotel. They were joined by their daughter Joyce Nicholson. Sadly, it was demolished in the 1970s and replaced by the present day Millom Court and the bungalows of the Inglemere Estate.
